Statement:

My name is Jim Kelly. I am a member of Unite and I have served as Chair of the Regional Executive Committee since 2019. I am seeking your support for the position of regional chair for the coming electoral cycle.

I am a Unite GC delegate to Chingford & Woodford Green CLP. I am also Vice President of LESE TUC. I have worked as a London cab driver for 30 years.

GENERAL ELECTION

In the 2019 General Election I campaigned in several constituencies, helping support excellent candidates such as Emma Dent Coad, Jon Cruddas, Gordon Nardell, Marsha De Cordova, Bambos Charalambous and Faiza Shaheen.

The party was unable to shift the focus of the election from Brexit, with many good MPs losing their seats in London.

On a positive note, there was a Labour gain in Putney, the only Labour gain on the night. Much was down to an excellent candidate, but also the hard work and commitment of dedicated party community organisers.

The community organising model should be at the core of our campaigning and electoral strategy.

WORKERS RIGHTS

Workers' rights must be on top of Labours agenda in London. Employers are exploiting covid to kickstart a race to the bottom in workers terms and conditions. The disgraceful use of Fire and Rehire at Heathrow is the best known, and it was good to see the support of Labour MPs on Heathrow union demonstrations.

Attacks on union organisation on passenger services enshrined in the Tory deal imposed on TfL, the derisory pay offer to NHS workers, job losses amongst shop workers and council workers, all are examples of policies which need to be opposed vigorously by London Labour working closely with London's unions. Council services should be insourced not outsourced.

MAYOR

Sadiq's re-election was a great result. Yet The Torie's are certainly not down in London, we need a united democratic party, with an engaged and enthusiastic membership,



standing on a radical socialist agenda to prepare for the inevitable economic downturn from Brexit and Covid.

HOUSING

Labour needs to be bolder in fighting the dysfunctional housing market in London. we need to be campaigning against estate regeneration schemes which lead to displaced working-class communities and increase inequality.

RACISM

As was pointed out by the motion on racism at the 2019 conference, racism never went away. The recent disgraceful racist comments on social media against black players in the England team show that the right is ready and able to exploit any opportunity.

LEADERSHIP

The country needs effective opposition to the Tories from the Labour Leadership. This is the most inept, corrupt government in living memory, yet where is our Labour voice? Labour Voters are saying they no longer know what Labour stands for. We need to build on our radical manifesto of 2017, but we also need a Leadership willing to come out fighting; as Gordon Brown said in his conference address in 2009, we need to "Think big and fight hard". As things stand, we are doing neither.

Statement:

My Name is James Mitchell, and I am a member of the Bermondsey and Old Southwark CLP. We have a proud record in our constituency of winning and retaining. As key workers, housing in London is clearly become an issue of affordability and with many who work in the food and leisure industries who are on low pay and precarious contracts, survival in London and towns and cities across Britain to support a family home has become impossible. With more people taking to using food banks and sleeping on the streets, we need to now be getting back to council-based rents and retaining council lands for building of council owned properties and stop private property developers taking over these lands and building homes for what seems to be the wealthy and overseas buyers, which is wiping out local communities.



So, to this end, I am standing for the position of vice-chair, to help us work through our differences and to help get our party back to what I believe we were fundamentally set up to do and that is to fight and protect our nation and workers.
